The Department of History at Knox College invites applications for a one-year position as Visiting Assistant Professor/Instructor of History in the Atlantic World to begin September 1, 2018, with possibility of renewal. Candidates should be able to offer courses in colonial North American history and West African history. The successful candidate will teach introductory and intermediate courses in North American and West African history, and possibly an upper-level research course based upon the candidate's area of expertise. Other teaching responsibilities will depend upon the candidate's specialties. The College has three academic terms per year, with a teaching load of two courses per term.

All candidates should have experience in or a commitment to working with diverse populations of students. This position speaks to the global approach to history that is a core principle of the department. It also makes a vital contribution to our commitment to interdisciplinary cooperation, allowing the department to maintain connections with other campus programs, particularly Africana Studies and Gender and Women's Studies.

Qualifications: Ph.D. in history or related field expected; exceptional ABD candidates considered.
