

But before then, you'll set the world on fire. You'll make your mark. And you'll bring fresh passion back to the classroom.


And for that, I thank you.




This month in the **Seymour Library Faculty Development Collection**, and thanks to Jessa Dahl for this recommendation, let me draw your attention to

Jensen, J. (2017). Write No Matter What: Advice for Academics. University of Chicago Press.

This month's book explores how to start writing... especially with all the competition for our time. I remember as a first-year faculty member here pleading for some insight into getting started on research and writing with all the other things I had to do. I wish I had this book back then.

According to the publisher, Jensen begins by busting the myth that colleges and universities have supportive writing environments. She points out that academia, an arena dedicated to scholarship, offers pressures that *prevent* scholarly writing. She shows how to acknowledge these less-than-ideal conditions, and how to keep these circumstances from draining writing time and energy. Jensen introduces tools and techniques that encourage frequent, low-stress writing. She points out common ways writers stall and offers workarounds that maintain productivity.



Her focus is not on content, but on how to overcome whatever stands in the way of academic writing.

This book (**LB2369**.**J46 2017**) forces us to think more about our writing lives and to "cut down the academic sword of Damocles."

Knox's Faculty Development Collection is located to the right of the circulation desk. This book, along with many others, can be found there. I encourage you to visit the collection and see what else we have available.

Mellon "Abolition for All Time" Faculty Innovation Grants

This grant program for Knox College faculty seeks to inspire further exploration of the "Abolition for All Time" Lab themes and advance innovations in Knox College's academic program and co-curriculum. The Abolition Lab aims to inspire reflection on core principles of the College's founding — including equal access to education and social activism — and their contemporary expression through civic engagement today.

Eligibility: All faculty members are invited to apply, including both previous participants in Abolition Lab projects and those who have not yet participated. We particularly welcome proposals that explore the implications of Ab Lab projects, whether directly or through new dimensions and approaches.

Scope: Proposed projects are not limited to humanities disciplines. We welcome discipline-based and interdisciplinary approaches that advance students' engagement with social and ethical issues.

Aim: The aim of this grant opportunity is to generate innovative proposals for the future of the Knox education. Successful projects will use the grant period to identify goals, establish parameters and possibilities,



outline needs and expectations, and examine the prospects for the proposed innovation. Final reports will present an actionable innovation plan.

ACM Grants Lab

This retreat-style event is designed to help faculty, staff, and institutional leaders turn promising ideas into competitive grant proposals. With expert-led workshops, dedicated writing time, and targeted peer feedback, participants will leave with tangible progress and greater confidence in their ability to make their external funding goals a reality.

The Associated Colleges of the Midwest (ACM) will cover costs (lodging, on-campus meals, programming, and partial travel reimbursement) for up to five participants from each member campus. Attendees can use the ACM Grants Lab to develop a wide range of proposals

Who should attend?

Attendees need to have a general idea of a project or initiative to develop during the ACM Grants Lab. The event will guide participants through the proposal development process, but it's not a time for blank-slate brainstorming: Participants should "BYOI" (Bring Your Own Idea).

The Application Process, Part I:

To maximize the benefit of this program to Knox College, Ole is accepting applications. The application should be an email to Ole J. Forsberg by **Friday**, **June 13**. In that email, provide answers to each of the following questions:

- 1. The ACM Grants Lab will be hosted on the Macalester College campus in St. Paul, MN, from August 12–15, 2025. Are you able to attend *all* of the days?
- 2. What is your current experience level seeking external grants and support? Have you done it in the past, or is this your first?
- 3. As you think about the proposal you want to develop, which disciplinary field at Knox best aligns with the focus?
- Describe the project or proposal you want to develop in the ACM Grants Lab. Be sure to include central questions and likely outcomes of the project (200 words or fewer).

On the weekend of the 15th, we will go through the applications and provide the next steps in the process (a.k.a.: Application Process, Part II). So, please watch your email for an announcement on June 16.
