Financial support from the ASSET Program and the Vovis Center for Research & Advanced Study enabled him to spend an entire summer researching period and musical theatre production.



# \$3.7 Million given for capital projects in FY17-18



What do people call a new addition to campus before it gets a name? Right now, the former Second Baptist Church at the corner of Cherry and South Streets is simply known as the Old Church. After its congregation decided to relocate, Knox decided to turn it into the new home of both the Center for Intercultural Life and Spiritual Life. Once complete, Knox will solicit ideas for its new name from students.

President Teresa Amott once observed to a group of alumni, "The great thing about Knox is it is exactly as you remember it. And the worst thing about Knox is ... it is exactly as you remember it!" New construction and renovations were a major part of the College's Knox 2018 strategic plan—and continued donor support is revitalizing the campus building by building, year by year.



The recent success of Knox's men's and women's soccer teams highlighted the limitations of its soccer field. Players couldn't use the field after heavy rains for fear of damaging the grass, and when the team hosted the Midwest Conference Championships in 2016, there was real concern that the turf wouldn't hold up under three days of continuous play. This summer, workers installed state-of-the-art synthetic turf that rebounds quickly from inclement weather and heavy use. New fencing will protect the field when it's not in use. Phase 2 renovations will add lighting, a new scoreboard, and a new press box.




The Xi Chapter of Beta Theta Pi has occupied their campus home just west of Alumni Hall for nearly 100 years. The current renovation, funded by Beta alumni, not only improves safety, energy efficiency, and accessibility, it updates the interior for the needs of 21st century Greeks, including space for 30 residents across a combination of single-, double-, and triple-occupancy rooms.



The Knox campus now has its first permanent space exclusively for curated art exhibits. alumni and student shows, and selections from its permanent art collection with the opening of the Borzello Gallery. As interest in the College's museum studies minor grows, it will offer a space for students to get realworld experience designing, producing, and promoting exhibitions.



Knox College has the oldest science building among its peer institutions in the Associated Colleges of the Midwest. Rather than start over from scratch, architects came up with an innovative plan to renovate the space in five phases, starting in the central core—recycling the building while trying to minimize disruption to faculty and students. An expanded glass atrium will create new study and collaboration spaces for students while visually connecting the building to the center of campus. The famous tiered classrooms in the core will become a new science learning commons, and the existing science library will be transformed into six reconfigurable classroom spaces.
