ANSO 263 In recent years, profound changes in the global economy, climate change, and transnational politics have culminated in large movements of people in almost every region. This course examines how people experience displacement, migration, and statelessness; how home, community and belonging are reconstituted both in exile and through the making of diaspora communities. We will also pursue related questions about how international laws, national policies, and practices of social exclusion or inclusion influence the broader context of migration. How do population movements affect politics at the international, regional, and local levels ñ and vice versa? In what ways are relations of kinship, family, and gender being reformulated in response to transnational movements? Reading materials will include ethnographic studies of migrant and diaspora communities, policy reports on the international refugee regime, literary works produced by migrant authors, and mainstream media around the globe.

CLAS 273K Is the Harry Potter series a classic? In this course, we will ponder that question by juxtaposing the novels, in particular Deathly Hallows, with ancient Greek and Roman texts often judged to be 'classics.' We will explore how Harry Potter draws on ancient mythology and examine how works of popular culture reflect their social and political circumstances. Along the way, comparing Harry Potter with ancient texts will help us think through key contemporary concerns: Do you have to agree with an author's views in order to enjoy their work? How do evolving reading communities (fandoms) affect our understanding of the text? And how can literature support social justice movements? IC and PI Elements; no prerequisites, but familiarity with the Harry Potter novels is expected.

ENG 380W A critical and comprehensive study of Sendak's key works for children, including the groundbreaking picture book trilogy: Where the Wild Things Are, In the Night Kitchen, and Outside Over There; the aesthetic influences (from Mozart to Blake to Laurel and Hardy) that inform Sendak's narrative art; and Sendak as a cultural force whose modern mythology helped redefine our notions of childhood and whose pop cultural reach has extended from Broadway to Spike Jonze films to wild thing hoodies. Of special consideration is the figure of the child in Sendak's work, its origins as well as its monstrous and angelic incarnations.
