Students also engage with multimedia aspects of hip-hop culture, including video, dance, fashion, and art. Case studies examine rap's intersections with British colonialism, sampling, whiteness, and gender and sexuality.

RELS 232 This course introduces students to formative texts in early Christianity, including texts of the New Testament and non-canonical texts. We will situate these texts in their own historical moment, considering them within Hellenistic Judaism and the Greco-Roman world. Diverse portrayals of the life and teaching of Jesus will emerge, and we will analyze ways that variety extends to the teachings of his followers. This course will also introduce modern methods of interpreting the Bible, including reading the New Testament in terms of postcolonialism, gender, sexuality, disability, and empire, in addition to historical and literary approaches. This course considers the different questions each scholarly method asks of a text, and the tools it uses to answer them. This course will familiarize students with the history and literary types of early Christianity, as well as different approaches to interpretation in the interest of equipping students for knowledgeable and respectful dialog.
