International Ambassadors play an important role in supporting prospective, incoming, and new international students as they explore Knox, apply to the College, and become members of our community. Ambassadors work as public representatives of the College, and therefore we select students with strong personal character, knowledge of the Knox experience, and a genuine interest in helping prospective, incoming, and new international students make an informed college choice and successful transition to Knox. These positions are challenging and demanding; prospective and incoming students tell us that they place great value on their communication with current students.

Responsibilities:

- Welcome new international students and serve as IPOP and Orientation Leaders for New Student Orientation.
- Assist with planning and facilitation of international orientation programs and programming throughout the academic year to support current international students
- Manage the international flags, including the Alumni Hall display and flag storage in Taylor Lounge
- Communicate with prospective students by email, Zoom, or other electronic platform and engage in personalized, genuine communication with students and their parents about the experience of international students at Knox
- Assist with administrative duties and other OISS projects as necessary
- Hours are flexible, but generally available for up to 3-5 hours/week during academic terms. For International Ambassadors remaining on campus during winter and spring vacation, limited hours may also be available during those periods.

- Early access to assigned residence hall room and some meals prior to fall term for training and work during the International Pre-Orientation Program (IPOP) and New Student Orientation.
